The Impact of Trump's Vile Racist Rhetoric; The Hate that Hate Produces

(TriceEdneyWire.com) - "Sadly, the overwhelming amount of violent crime in our major cities is committed by Blacks and Hispanics..." - Trump Tweet 6-5-13

"They (Democrats) don't care about crime and want illegal immigrants, no matter how bad they may be, to pour into and infest our Country, like MS-13. - Trump Tweet 6-19-18

"Why are we having all these people from shithole countries come here?" - Trump 1-11-18

On August 3, 22 people were killed, and dozens injured in a shooting at a Walmart in El Paso, Texas. Authorities have uncovered a document that they believe links the shooter's actions to his dismay at the increasing Hispanic population in Texas.

On April 27, 2019, one woman was killed, and three other people were injured at the Chabad of Poway synagogue in Poway, CA. In an antisemitic and racist open letter posted on 8chan shortly before the shooting and signed with the shooters name, the author blamed Jews for alleged "white genocide" ...a conspiracy theory, which he referred to as the "meticulously planned genocide of the European race".

On October 27, 2018, eleven people were killed and seven (including the perpetrator) were injured at the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Citing the Central American migrant caravans and immigrants, the shooter posted on "Gab" shortly before the attack that "HIAS likes to bring invaders in that kill our people. I can't sit by and watch my people get slaughtered..."

At least three people were killed, and 12 others wounded in a shooting at the Gilroy Garlic Festival in Northern California on Sunday, July 28. Nine people were killed, and 27 others injured in Dayton, OH Sunday, August 4. Police have yet to determine the motive in these shootings.

Much has been made of President Trump's racist and xenophobic Tweets and rants. The discussion now centers around the "rise" of white supremacist language, web sites, activity and action. Analysts and others are trying to assign blame to President Trump for inciting this hatred and violence...but this is not new; this is America! To quote H. Rap Brown, "violence (and in this case racism) is as American as cherry pie".

America as a settler colonial state was founded upon violence, racism, bigotry and hatred. This month America commemorates the 400 years that enslaved Africans arrived on the shores of Port Comfort, Va. in 1619.

It's codified in the Constitution. Article 1, Section 2 of the US Constitution - Better known as the 3/5ths compromise. Article IV, Section 2, Clause 3, -The Fugitive Slave Clause and Article 1, Section 9 - the importation of enslaved Africans was allowed for 25 years after the Constitution was ratified.

The Indian Removal Act was signed into law on May 28, 1830, by President Andrew Jackson. The act has been referred to as a unitary act of systematic genocide as countless numbers of Chickasaw, Choctaw, Creek, Seminole, and Cherokee people (including mixed-race and Africans who lived among them) were forcibly removed from their ancestral lands in the Southeastern United States and forced to relocate west of the Mississippi. It will never be determined how many people perished

The Supreme Court was very clear in its language on March 6, 1857, Chief Justice Roger Taney issued what is widely regarded as the worst Supreme Court opinion ever in the infamous Dred Scott v. Sanford case, "[African Americans] had for more

than a century before been regarded as beings of an inferior order, and altogether unfit to associate with the white race, either in social or political relations; and so far inferior, that they had no rights which the white man was bound to respect..."

These are just a few examples of the historic basis of President Trump's racist tropes, but Trump is not alone. On the evening of March 21, 1915, President Woodrow Wilson attended a special screening at the White House of THE BIRTH OF A

during this process also known as NATION, a film directed by D.W. Griffith and based on THE CLANSMAN, a novel written by Wilson's good friend Thomas Dixon. It depicted the Ku Klux Klan as valiant saviors of a post-war South, ravaged by Northern carpetbaggers and immoral freed blacks. The film helped to revive the Klan and its domestic terror in African American and Jewish communities.

> Even the beloved Ronald Reagan (Obama's favorite) was clear in his racism. According to Slate, In 1971, when both then-CA governor Reagan and President Nixon were frustrated about a United Nations vote to recognize the People's Republic of China. African delegations sided with others in supporting Chinese sovereignty over Taiwan. In a racist phone call to President Richard Nixon Reagan said, "To see those, those monkeys from those African countries—damn them, they're still uncomfortable wearing shoes!" Reagan said, to laughter from Nixon.

> Trump is not the progenitor of this racist rhetoric. He is an accelerant of it and the resulting violence. What is most dangerous is how Trump has now neo-liberalized racism. By using his bully pulpit as president to spew his hatred and racism for political advantage, he has given the green light to like-minded white supremacists to act out individually. He is neo-liberalizing or privatizing what here-to-for has been government sanctioned violence.

> So, whether it is Trump's people from "shithole countries" or Reagan's "monkeys from those African countries" the controlling American sentiment is that people of color in this country still have no rights which the white man is bound to respect. Trump's vile racist rhetoric is the hate that hate produces.

First, Look in the Mirror, Mr. President, to Quell America's Deadly Violence

(TriceEdneyWire.com) - The horrifying and heartbreaking news of the domestic terrorist attacks in El Paso. Texas. and Dayton, Ohio, in less than 24 hours over the weekend reached me while I was in Poland, a country haunted by the deadly power of politically irresponsible and racist rhetoric.

I was participating in a series of events commemorating the 75th anniversary of the mass murder at Auschwitz-Birkenau death factory near Krakow, where in one night the Nazis killed more than 4.000 Roma and Sinti men. women and children, classified and persecuted by the Nazis as "Gypsies," aliens, undocumented and other.

The motivation of the young White killer in Dayton is unclear. But in El Paso, a 21-yearold white man apparently posted to social media a hate-filled, antiimmigrant rant before driving nine hours and 600 miles from the Dallas area to a Walmart, where you can see Mexico from the parking lot, to kill as many brown-skinned people as possi-

Wielding a semiautomatic, military-style rife — a weapon of mass destruction — the Texas shooter killed 20 people and wounded dozens more in a matter of minutes. The death toll in

Rep. Waters to American Farmers: Denounce Donald Trump & His Lies!

WASHINGTON — Congresswoman Maxine Waters (CA-43) released a statement in response to the escalation of Donald Trump's trade war with China. Donald Trump announced last week that he will impose an additional 10 percent tariff on \$300 billion worth of Chinese imports on top of the 25 percent tariffs already imposed on \$250 billion in Chinese imports.[1]China has threatened retaliation. [2]Major stock indexes posted large losses the following day,[3] and the stock market remains volatile. Trump's latest tariff announcement follows last month's announcement by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) of the details of a \$16 billion aid package for farmers adversely impacted by retaliatory tariffs,[4] which is in addition to a \$12 billion aid package for farmers announced last year.[5]The Congresswoman's statement follows:

dous suffering among American farmers, so much so that the USDA has offered a total of \$28 billion over the past year to farmers adversely impacted by retaliatory tariffs. This taxpayer money could have been spent to improve our nation's schools and health services, fix dilapidated roads and bridges, and expand services to seniors and veterans in rural and urban communities alike. Instead, the Trump administration is giving billions in bailouts to farmers who are losing money because of his foolish trade wars.

"Needless to say, most American farmers are hard-working people who would rather sell their products than receive a government welfare check. But Donald Trump has offered them nothing but empty promises and lies.

"Trump's farmer bailout is not even helping the family farmers who need it the most. Instead, the money has gone overwhelmingly to the biggest and wealthiest agricultural producers. According to a recent analysis of USDA data by the Environmental Working Group, more than half of the farmer aid payments have been doled out to the top one-tenth of recipients. An astonishing total of \$2.8 million went to a single farm in Missouri. Furthermore, the top 1 percent of farmer aid recipients received an average of \$183,331 each, while the bottom 80 percent received an average of less than \$5,000.

Meanwhile, thousands of bailout recipients are actually residents of the nation's largest cities, and minority farmers continue to be left out of the program. [6]

"Trump promised to support family farmers, even accusing his rival – Hillary Clinton – of wanting to 'shut down family farms'.[7]He also claimed to be the ultimate dealmaker. Yet two years later, his trade war with China has caused pain and suffering for farmers, but there is no deal in sight. Indeed, the only deals Trump has made as our nation's president are those that benefit himself, his family, and his wealthy friends and campaign donors.

"To all of the farmers who remain silent in the face of Donald Trump's disastrous trade policies and incessant lies: I urge you to stop waiting for a bailout and denounce this president for the con man he is."

the El Paso shooting now stands at 22.

The scourge of homegrown racial terrorism is not new. Since the birth of the Klan during Reconstruction, to the White Citizen's councils of the '60s to Timothy McVeigh's slaughter of 168 people, including 19 children, in Oklahoma City, the radical and racist right has used guns and bombs to intimidate and spread fear. President Donald Trump said many of the right things at the White House Monday morningin condemning the shootings, racism, bigotry and White supremacy.

Better late than never. Now he must do the right thing. He can start by looking at the man in the mirror. He must end his use of racially charged (often racist) rhetoric and tweets for political gain. It is divisive, dangerous and diversionary. I think he is better than that. I know the country is.

The president should also clean the swamp inside his administration. During his campaign and in the White House — the people's house — Trump has surrounded himself with racial ideologues, including his



immigrant-bashing speech writer Stephen Miller, a close college friend of Richard Spencer, who, along with former KKK leader and Trump endorser, David Duke, were organizers of the demonstrations in Charlottesville where hundreds of neo-Nazis marched through the streets, chanting, "Jews will not replace us."

Racism is a pathology. It is unscientific. It is immoral. It is a sickness. It is deadly. The ideology of white supremacy is spewing hate, anti-immi-

grant and racially polarizing rhetoric. It is cannon fodder for these mass killings. These are not killings of passion, but political killings. Calling the shooters mentally ill is dismissing their plan of action, their ideology of supremacy and hate. They are at war. They know what they're doing and why.

We have a gun crisis, a hate crisis and a leadership crisis. Trump must use his bully pulpit for something more than bullying. He must lead the way with action, not just words, in the passage of tough, meaningful gun control and an immediate ban on the military-style weapons used by both killers in El Paso and Dayton.

He must demand his fellow Republicans do the same. The House has passed gun legislation that would likely reduce such mass killings in the future, but Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell has refused to bring it before the Senate for a vote. Mr. President, start twisting arms. These political acts of domestic terrorism are an attempt to undercut our democracy. The combination of well-armed white nationalists and white supremacists, and a multiracial democracy, cannot co-exist.

The president must take a moral stand for humanity and curb his ugly rhetoric. His FBI must clamp down on right-wing, white nationalist groups inspiring and committing these acts of violence. He must join the American people who are demanding sensible gun safety measures. Prayers and condolences are not enough. We need action. We need gun control. We need the political will and moral leadership to stop the violence, save the children — and the country.

What To Do If You Lose Your Health Insurance

Transamerica Center for Health Studies

(NAPS)—Losing your health insurance can be stressful and confusing as you explore the options for new coverage. To recover, it is important to understand all your options, their costs and potential restrictions before purchasing new coverage. Careful planning can help you find the coverage that best meets your needs.

If you are in the market for new insurance, you are not alone. Nonprofit Transamerica Center for Health Studies' annual consumer survey found that over one in three (35 percent) insured adults acquired new health insurance in the past 12 months. And a strong majority (61 percent) of uninsured respondents said cost prevents them from obtaining health coverage.

Do you need health insurance? While the Internal Revenue Service no longer penalizes individuals on their federal taxes if they do not have health insurance, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Vermont and the District of Columbia all require residents to be insured or pay a tax penalty. Other states are considering adopting a health insurance mandate as well, so be sure to check these tax requirements. Even in states that do not require it, health insurance can help protect you (and your loved ones) from high medical costs, expected or not.

It is a very difficult situation when you lose your health insurance whether you lost your employer-based coverage, can no longer afford your current premium on individual coverage, lost your parents' or spouse's coverage, experienced a divorce, or have a new addition to your family. At that moment of uncertainty and concern for your health, what are your options for new health insurance coverage?

Join Your Parents' or Spouse's Plan

If you are under 26 years old, you may be added or remain on your parents' health insurance (if it covers children). Adult children can join or remain on a parent's plan even if they are married; not living with their parents; attending school; not financially dependent on their parents; or eligible to enroll in their employer's plan.

If you are married and your spouse's employer-based coverage covers dependents, you can be added to that health insurance. This change to your spouse's employer-based coverage may be limited to the company open enrollment period once each year.

Shop the Exchange



Another place to look is your state's Health Insurance Exchange. About 80 percent of customers purchasing a health plan through the Exchanges qualify for a subsidy on their premiums, depending on their income level. Health Insurance Exchanges are the only place to offer these subsidies, which are available for singles with a 2019 annual income between \$12,140 and \$48,560, or income between \$25,100 and \$100,400 for a family of four. (Income limits are different in states that offer "expanded" Medicaid coverage, meaning a wider number of low-income residents can qualify.) You can check for basic information about your state's Exchange on our website: www.TransamericaCenterforHealthStudies.org.

It is important to know that you have up to 60 days after losing your previous insurance or experiencing a life event (new baby, marriage, etc.) to purchase coverage in an Exchange. Otherwise, you have to wait until the Exchange open enrollment period each fall to sign up.

Determine Eligibility for

If you are lower income or unemployed, you may qualify for Medicaid in your state. Generally, the income limit is about \$12,140 for singles and \$25,100 for a family of four, though state requirements vary. Medicaid provides full health coverage with little or no out-of-pocket cost to you and your family. Some states have work/ community engagement requirements for adults. You can check a state's Medicaid income qualifications and requirements on our website: www.TransamericaCenterforHealth-Studies.org.

Buy Direct

You can also purchase health insurance directly from an insurance provider. Health plans with the "essential health benefits" required by the Affordable Care Act can be purchased directly from health plans, often on the website. You might also consider working with an insurance broker who can help you understand the different plan options avail-

able to you and the levels

of coverage. Consider Gap and

Short-Term Insurance Some health insurance products that do not qualify as major medical health insurance are also available. They are sometimes called gap insurance, but you should know the limitations of these plans before purchasing.

- Critical illness insurance provides a cash payment if you are diagnosed with cancer, have a heart attack, suffer a stroke or another serious and costly illness.
- Accident insurance gives you a cash payout if you are in an accident. A plan may have daily payouts for specific events, such as a cash payment for every day you spend in the hospital.
- Short-term health insurance plans also do not comply with the Affordable Care Act, but they can provide you with health insurance if you need a stopgap until obtaining full coverage. Short-term health plans can provide catastrophic health coverage but some states limit their availability. It is important to note that short-term medical

plans are not required to cover mental health services, outpatient prescription drugs, substance use disorder treatment, maternity care or other essential health benefits. Moreover, short-term plans do not cover pre-existing conditions and may deny you coverage based on your past medical history.

Before you sign up for

health insurance again, do your homework and shop around. That is the best way to make sure you find the best option for your needs.





The Passing of Toni Morrison: A Loss for the Racial Justice Community As Well As the Literary World

(TriceEdneyWire. "Oppressive language does more than represent violence; it is violence; does more than represent the limits of knowledge; it limits knowledge. Whether it is obscuring state language or the fauxlanguage of mindless media; whether it is the proud but calcified language of the academy the commodity language science; whether it is malign language law-without-ethics, language designed the estrangement minorities, hiding plunder in literary cheek - it rejected, exposed. and language blood, vulnerabilities, tucks its fascist boots crinolines respectability and patriotism as it moves relentlessly toward the bottom line and the bottomed-out mind." -Toni Morrison, Nobel

A few years after being awarded the Nobel Prize for literature, for a body of work known for centering the Black American experience, Toni Morrison was asked by a white reporter when she would "incorporate white lives" into her books "in a substantial way."

Lecture, 1993

"You can't understand how powerfully racist that question is, can you?" she asked. "You could never ask a white author, "When are you going to write about Black people?' Whether he did or not, or she did or not. Even the inquiry comes from a position of being in the center."

Morrison likened

herself to a Russian author, writing in Russian, about Russia. "The fact that it gets translated and read by other people is a benefit, it's a plus. but he's not obliged to ever consider writing about French people, or Americans, or anybody."

Morrison's death this week, at the age of 88, is a loss not only to the literary world, but to the cause of racial justice and civil rights. And it comes at a time when her unique voice is especially relevant.

Shortly after the election of Donald Trump in 2016, she published an essay entitled "Make America White Again," in which she argued that white America's loss of "the conviction of their natural superiority" had led to its debasement. slaughter unarmed men women of color at the hands of police and racially-motivated mass murder, the bombing of Black churches and white America's apparent tolerance for all of it -- she asserted, were part of the death knell of white superiority.

"If it weren't so ignorant and pitiful, one could mourn this collapse of dignity in service to an evil cause," she wrote. It is telling that what the interviewer noticed most about Morrison's work was the absence of white characters; white privilege can be like air or light, notable only when it is absent. And according to Morrison, white voters were beginning to feel it ebb away.

"Toni Morrison" may have been as much a creation as her novels; she said she regretted using the nickname, derived from her chosen confirmation name,

up in the integrated town of Lorain, Ohio, and was disillusioned by what she saw as rampant colorism when she arrived at Howard University in 1949. Unlike classmates who had grown up in the south, she experienced legal segregation for the first time in Washington, D.C., but could not believe it was real.

Brown, applied for the patent and invented a system with a motorized camera that could show images on a monitor. That patent (#3,482,037) was eventually granted, her invention went on to become a technological precursor to how modern day home security systems would be designed.

Brown's invention had very unique features for the time; The motorized camera at the door could slide up and down to look out of four peepholes. Anything the camera captured would be displayed on a monitor. Her system also included a radio-controlled lock that would allow the

front door to remotely unlocked, and an audiovideo alarm system that could be used to see and communicate with whoever was at the door.

For her genius invention, which obviously contributed to the future of home security systems, Brown was given a prestigious award by the National Scientists Committee (NSC). But for the most part, her invention has gone unnoticed and undocumented by the mainstream media and literature.

Sadly, Marie Van Brittan Brown died on February 2, 1999 at the age of 77-years old.

staff.

Social Security Questions and Answers

Question:

How can I protect myself against identity theft?

Answer:

First, don't carry your Social Security card with you. Keep it secure at home with your other important papers. Second, don't readily give out your Social Security number. While many banks, schools, doctors, landlords, and others will request your number, it is your decision whether to provide it. Ask if there is some other way to identify you in their records. If you are the victim of identity theft, you should report it right away. To report identity theft, fraud, or misuse of your Social Security number, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) (the nation's consumer protection agency) recommends you:

• Place a fraud alert on your credit file by contacting one of the following companies (The company you contact is required to contact the other two, which will then place alerts on your reports.):

Question:

Can I conduct my Social Security business online in the event of a hurricane or other disaster that keeps me from visiting an office?

Answer:

Yes. You can conduct most of your business with Social Security online at www.socialsecurity.gov, where you'll find a wealth of information and services. For example, you can create or access your own my Social Security account, apply online for Social Security benefits or Medicare, and check the status of your pending application. If you're already receiving Social Security benefits, you can change your address, phone number, or your direct deposit information, get a replacement Medicare card, or get an instant proof of income letter. You also can get your Social Security Statement online. Your Statement lets you check and verify your earnings record and see estimates of your future benefits. You also can find out if your local office is open at www.socialsecurity.gov/emergency. That site lists any office closings and delays.

Question:

I applied for a Social Security card for my child at the hospital and the card came back with the first name misspelled. What should I do?

Answer:

Go to your local Social Security office or card center to ask for a corrected card. We need to see at least two original documents proving your child's:

- U.S. citizenship; and
- Identity.

We also must see proof of your identity, as the parent. The documents you show us must be either originals or copies certified by the issuing agency. We cannot accept photocopies or notarized copies. To find out more, go to www.socialsecurity.gov/ssnumber. There, you can learn what documents you need to fill out and print, and then bring or mail the information to us. You may also want to read the publication, *Social Security Numbers For Children*, available at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs.

FILM REVIEW: Brian Banks wrongfully convicted high school football player

In this #MeToo age, a biofilm about a wrongfully convicted high school football player, who was accused, tried and imprisoned for rape, is timely.

The real Brian Banks, the subject of this movie, lived through an ordeal that was tragic, inspiring and often profound, something is lost in this one-dimensional retelling of his life experiences. Something turns his extraordinary story of resilience into a decent but ordinary made-for-TV-like movie.

In 2002, Brian Banks (Aldis Hodge, Straight Outta Compton, Hidden Figures) is a junior



at Polytechnic High School in Long Beach, California and a linebacker football player. He has verbally committed to attending USC based on his football prowess. The future looks bright for him and his single mom Leomia (Sherri Shepherd). One day at school, Banks runs into coed Kinnesha Rice (Xosha Roquemore), and they decide to hook up in a secluded school building where kids go to make out and get down.

While in their secret place, Brian has a change of heart, leaves Kinnesha behind and she is forced to explain to a security guard why she is in a notorious spot. Flustered, the student fabricates a story about being raped. Her lie leads to Banks' arrest, a too-hasty plea deal, trial, imprisonment, a tough parole and a sex offender label that haunts him

Banks can't live, work or be near places that children gather—including schools, parks and malls. He's lost any academic or professional football opportunities. Unless his conviction is overturned, his future is bleak and he's hit a wall.

That's a galvanizing setup. Sympathetic protagonist, wrongly accused, innocent and determined yet filled with self-doubt. He's the David. A California judicial system that rarely—if ever—overturns cases against convicts is the Goliath. Audiences like to watch a "good fight" against injustice. Bring it on.

Screenwriter Doug Atchison (Akeelah and the Bee) fit all the characters and pieces of Banks jumbled life into an easy-to-decipher script. Maybe too easy. Son, mom, accuser, mentors. The California Innocence Project (CIP) is also in the mix. It's a non-profit that helps wrongfully convicted prisoners and is headed by Justin Brooks (Greg Kinnear). Other supporting characters (new girlfriend, skeptical prosecutor, accuser's stubborn mom) augment the cast. But the focus is on Banks—his sorrow, integrity, courageousness and perseverance.



Given a story that sells itself, and a quest that provides innate momentum, you'd think filmmaker Tom Shadyac (The Nutty Professor) would have an easy time directing a film that's powered by its own natural thrust. Yet, his plodding direction slows things down. The footage (Ricardo Diaz, cinematographer) is bland, lacks style and eye-catching composition.

Shadyac fails to get the cast's emotions to rise to a level of desperation that piques attention. Everything seems average. Smart, intuitive directors (e.g. Sidney Lumet "Q & A,") find ways to lift urban dramas off the page and turn them into compelling films that are more than the sum of their parts. Not the case here.

Can't blame the editing (Greg Hayden, Zoolander), art direction (Starlet Jacobs), production design (Teresa Mastropierro) or costumes (Amanda Ford) for the general malaise. The tech credits are just decent enough to make this film semi-engaging for 99 minutes. The ensemble cast is proficient, but none stand out, except the lead.

Big question: "Why is Aldis Hodge in a soso movie like this?" His deft interpretation of the character, the raw emotion he displays and the solid screen persona he creates crown his performance. He saves the film. At this point in his career, Hodges should be starring in far bigger projects than this. He should be one of the Avengers, vying for parts Denzel Washington has aged out of and up for roles that lead to Oscars. He's that good.

Brian Banks' story is a cautionary tale in an era when a false accusation can ruin a career. It shows that harm that can be done when well-intentioned advocates believe an accuser before hearing all the facts. Also, Banks' predicament clearly indicates why parents should be in the room when their offspring are negotiating plea deals with public defenders. For a multitude of reasons, Banks' experience should be shared.

The Brian Banks film, within the confines of its made-for-TV-movie-of-the-week approach, is not as three-dimensional as Banks real-life story. It lacks the artistry of an indie film, the dramatic chops of a cable film (HBO) and the repeat-viewing power necessary for a streaming movie (Netflix).

If this well-meant film has a saving grace, besides its message of resilience, its Hodges' powerful performance. He's an Oscar-caliber actor in need of an Oscar-caliber film.

The team's coach, Nyre Williams, was a former professional golf player since 2003 after he went to Tennessee State University on a golf scholarship. He is also the director of The First Tee of East Lake Foundation, a youth development program that mentors and teaches golf to young people.

All the boys on the Drew Charter School's golf team are members of The First Tee of East Lake, where they were taught not only how to play golf, but also encouraged about life goals and healthy habits.





The Ugly History of America's Racist Soft Drink Brands





The truth about the history of America's favorite soft drinks, Coca-Cola and Pepsi, may shock you. Coca-Cola, for example, founded in the year 1892, was originally a product only intended for white people. According to the New York Times, Coke's recipe was heavily influenced by white supremacy and it was marketed mainly to the white middle class. Throughout the 1920's and 1930's, the company "studiously" and purposely ignored African-American market.

Pepsi, on otherhand, started out by primarily targeting African American consumers. In fact, during the 1940's, the company launched "negro а markets" department and even had Black sales representatives working hard to promote the brand in urban areas. They also aggressively hired Black models to appear in Pepsi ads that were featured in Black publications. Special point-of-purchase displays also appeared in stores that were mostly patronized by African-Americans.

Neither company, Coca-Cola or Pepsi, had an inclusive marketing strategy in the beginning to promote their soft drinks to people of all ethnic backgrounds. In

fact, according to The Atlantic, they were avidly known as 'white' and 'black' drinks for quite some time.

later years, however, both companies did eventually begin to implement diversity the advertising campaigns after realizing that they were missing out on the opportunity to generate billions of dollars in revenue. But that didn't put an end to the racism.

In the year 2000, for example, Coca-Cola was ordered to pay \$156 million to settle a federal lawsuit brought by a group of Black employees who accused the company of racial discrimination.

Pepsi was forced to do the same in 2012 when they paid \$3.13 million to settle a federal lawsuit stemmed by accusations of racial discrimination using criminal background checks to screen out job applicants arrested were not convicted, but disproportionately excluding Blacks.
