

Three Ole Miss frat brothers, posing smiles and guns, shot up one of the signs. They were members of Kappa Alpha Order, whose spiritual founder is U.S. Civil War traitor General Robert E. Lee.

Two men carried the shot-up sign and placed it at the base of a Confederate statue on the University of Mississippi campus.

Relatives of Emmett Till attended the ceremony to see the sign installed in Graball Landing on the banks of the Tallahatchie River where Till's bloated and beaten body was discovered after unexpectedly floated to the water's surface.

Till, a 14- year-old from Chicago, was spending the summer of 1955 with relatives in Money, Mississippi, where his mother believed he would be safe from Chicago gangs.

But two white men who brutally beat him and shot him in the head in what some call a lynching.

J.W. Milam and his half-brother, Roy Bryant,

murdered Till. teenager's lifeless body, which had been weighted down so no one would ever find it, was thrown like a bag of garbage into the Tallahatchie, a 230mile long river that flows through Mississippi.

Jet magazine, whose editor and founder was John H. Johnson, published a photo of the open casket, showing Till's face disfigured beyond recognition. His teeth were missing, one eye was hanging from its socket and one ear had been severed. Mamie Till, his mother, leaned over the casket, and wept uncontrollably.

But even in death, Till did not find peace.

His mother buried her son in Burr Oak Cemetery, African Americanowned cemetery in Alsip, Illinois. Investigators discovered Till's casket had been desecrated along with others in a scheme to resell burial plots.

The first sign that notified visitors this was where Till's body was discovered was thrown into the Tallahatchie. The next two signs were riddled with bullets. These incidents occurred over 11

In the summer of 1956, an all- white, all- male jury acquitted Milam and Bryant of murdering Till. The jury took a little longer reaching a verdict than expected.

It wasn't because crime's brutality made some them want to vomit or even rethink their decision.

One juror explained they took time to finish their soda pops, which were bottles of Coca Cola.

he allegedly whistled at Milam's wife, Carolyn. Years later in a book, she denied the incident ever happened.

Ed Bradley, correspondent for CBS's 60 minutes, reported on the news program that Henry Lee Loggins, a black former employee of J.W. Milam, may have participated in Till's kidnapping and murder.

Loggins denied any involvement. Others said they saw Loggins, Milam and Bryant standing on the porch of the house where Till was staying because kidnapped. was Loggins was accused of leading Bryant and Milam to the house where Till was staying. In the segregated South black homes did not have addresses.

Till's brutal murder set off a chain of events no one could imagine.

Look magazine paid Milam and Bryant for an interview. During the interview, they admitted murdered they teenager.

Bryant and Milam owned a store and many of the establishment's customers were black. Blacks boycotted the store and it went out of business.

Rosa Parks, seamstress, was sitting on a bus owned by a Chicago company in Montgomery, Alabama. She was angry about what happened to

A white man ordered Parks to give up her seat him, the custom of time. She refused. Police arrested her.

E.D. Nixon, a Pullman Porter and local civil rights leader, bailed Parks out of

Jo Ann Gibson Robinson, a teacher at Alabama State College and leader of the Women's Political Council, called for an organized a bus boycott, which led to one of the greatest victories for blacks in the civil rights movement—The Montgomery Bus Boycott.

Robinson's idea was to boycott the buses for one day, but the action was so successful, it continued. The boycott began December 5, 1955 and ended on December 20, 1956.

Historians have given Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. credit for the successful boycott, but it was black women who came up with the idea and organized it. The story of the boycott is told in the book "The Thunder of Angels: The Montgomery Bus Boycott and the People Who Broke the Back of Jim Crow"

Leaf Collection Program Begins Nov. 4

A variety of methods will be used to inform residents when leaf collection will occur in each neighborhood. The city will announce to the media each Friday where crews will be working the following week and the week after. That will give residents time to rake leaves to the curb and make sure cars are off the street.

There are several other ways to determine when crews will be on your street:

- Sign up for Toledo Text Alerts to be alerted when leaf collection crews will be in your neighborhood, and of any change in plans. Toledo Texts Alerts will notify residents two weeks prior, again one week prior to pick-up, and again when the collection is complete. - Residents can refer to the map on the city website for information on their specific addresses. The map will be posted at this link: https://toledo.oh.gov/services/public-service/streets-bridges-harbor/2019-leaf-collection/.

- Check the city Facebook and Twitter accounts on Fridays.
- Watch for signs to be posted on your street.

Residents should rake or blow leaves into the street, just over the curb, as close as possible to their leaf collection date. Do not place leaves in the street weeks ahead of time. That will clog





at the lynching of African American males and females (yes, children were also lynched!).



Republican Senate Stands in the Way of Moving America Forward

(TriceEdneyWire.com) - Americans are disgusted that Washington has become dysfunctional, even as Americans struggle with

ever greater challenges — from stagnant wages and growing inequality to catastrophic climate change to soaring health-care costs to a decrepit and dangerously aged infrastructure. President Donald Trump blames House Democrats, saying they are "getting nothing done in Congress."

Don't believe it. The record is clear: The Democratic majority in the House has passed major reforms that would begin to address America's challenges. All of them have been blocked by Republicans in the Senate, led by Mitch McConnell, who calls himself the "grim reaper" dedicated to killing reform.

As of July, in their first half year as the majority, House Democrats had passed a total of 569 bills that are blocked in the Senate. These include major reforms that would make America better. Consider:

The For the People Act — HR 1 — contained the most comprehensive campaign finance and voting reforms since the 1965 Voting Rights Act.

It would have made it easier to register to vote, harder to gerrymander districts, forced disclosure of secret funds, required paper ballots to limit election interference and would have begun to counter the influence of big money in our elections. McConnell refuses even to allow a vote in the Senate. HR 5—the Equality Act—extends civil rights protections to members of the LGBTQ community.

This is long overdue. McConnell refuses to allow a vote in the Senate. HR 6 — the American Dream and Promise Act — would have protected the Dreamers and offered a path to citizenship to 2 million.

Poll of likely voters shows rising student debt problems: Weakened borrower protections, blocked debt relief cited

When likely voters across the country were recently asked their opinions about student loan borrowing, 82% agreed that the still-growing \$1.5 trillion debt is a national crisis. Even when partisan affiliations were included, the solid concern for this unsustainable financial burden held strong: 74% of Republicans, 80% of independents, and 90% of Democrats.

When asked further about the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB)'s reduced efforts to protect students from abusive student loans and student loan services, those most concerned were Blacks, Latinx (73%), consumers earning less than \$50,000 per year (72%). Additionally, voters in early Democratic Primary States agreed at 77%, as did both women and military or veterans' households that polled 70% each.

Conducted by Lake Research Partners and Chesapeake Beach Consulting, the poll was jointly commissioned by the Americans for Financial Reform (AFR) and Center for Responsible Lending (CRL). Its student loan results, released on October 2, found that recent actions by the Department of Education (DOE) and the CFPB both contributed to consumer concerns.

Higher penalty fees charged to struggling borrowers, making it harder for state and federal law enforcement agencies to pursue wrongdoing by state loan servicers and blocked debt relief for students who were defrauded by for-profit institutions were the top DOE criticisms cited in survey.

"[T]he Department of Education seems to be making it easier for for-profit colleges and servicers to take advantage of students," said Debbie Goldstein, CRL Executive Vice President. "We need a Department of Education that holds for-profit institutions accountable for abusive practices and a CFPB with a division that protects borrowers from predatory student loan servicers."



"Without proactive regulatory action and strong state laws," continued Goldstein, "students of color will continue to carry larger debt burdens, exacerbating the racial wealth gap."

"The student debt crisis in the United States deserves greater attention and voters know it," noted Alexis Goldstein AFR Senior Policy Counsel. "Borrowers need federal authorities as allies, not as apologists for the for-profit college industry."

The disproportionate student debt burdens borne by Black and Latino borrowers was the focus of a joint research report by the NAACP, National Urban League, UNIDOS US, Leadership Conference Education Fund and CRL. Initially published this July, QUICKSAND: Borrowers of Color & the Student Debt Crisis, the report examined how unprecedented debt levels weigh heaviest on Black America.

Key findings from that report show that: Today, over half of all families with Black heads of household aged 25-40 have student debt.

Black bachelor's degree graduates are unable to afford loan repayments

at five times the rate of comparable white graduates. These Black grads are also more likely to default than whites who never completed a degree.

Four years after graduation, nearly half of black graduates owe more on their undergraduate student loans than they did when they received their degree; by contrast, only 17% of white graduates face this same dilemma.

Similarly findings and concerns were found in a September student loan debt report entitled Stalling Dreams by Brandeis University's Institute on Assets and Social Policy, a part of its Heller School for Social Policy and Management. Among its key findings:

Twenty years after starting school, the typical Black borrower owed about \$17,500 more than their white peers;

The typical Black student loan holder in their 30's, has negative total wealth of \$10,700 compared to whites who are close to breaking even; and

About half of all Black borrowers and a third of all Latinx borrowers wind up defaulting on their student loans within 20 years.

With researchers and consumers agreeing that student debt is at crisis levels, the larger question becomes: What – as a nation – are we prepared to do about it? And if so – when?

With 44 million people affected by student loan debt, this trillion- dollar issue should not be ignored but rather vigorously debated as part of the 2020 elections in the interest of our collective futures.

"We need a racial equity filter for solutions to reverse the consequences of our current privatized high education financing regime," states Brandeis' Stalling Dreams. "We need a return to strong public investment in higher education that acknowledges the societal benefit on an educated public."

In other words, if you're drowning in student debt, your education is working against you – instead of for you. It's time for a new paradigm in American education.

without official status. McConnell refuses to allow a vote in the Senate. HR 7 — the Paycheck Fairness Act — would have strengthened measures to counter the growing pay gap between men and women. No vote in the Senate. HR 8 — the Bipartisan Background Checks Act — would have required universal background checks in the sale of guns, a reform supported by the vast majority of Americans. No vote in the Senate.

This list can go on. The Raise the Wage Act would have raised the minimum wage to \$15 per hour by 2025. House Democrats passed a bill to return the U.S. to the Paris Climate Accord, which Trump scorns. House Democrats have passed legislation that would protect those with pre-existing conditions and lower prescription drug prices.

They've acted to save net neutrality. They've passed nine bills to aid veterans, including extending childcare to veterans with young children. House Democrats put forth a major plan to rebuild our infrastructure; Trump stormed

out of the meeting set up to discuss it. When the Senate actually passed a House resolution to get U.S. forces out of the Yemen catastrophe, Trump vetoed it.

The House isn't paralyzed; the Senate is. As House Speaker Nancy Pelosi summarized, "the Senate is the grave-yard where bills that pass in the Congress, that have bipartisan support in the country, go to die."

For McConnell and Republicans, paralysis is a partisan political ploy. McConnell openly brags about the strategy. With Trump dominating the air waves, they believe that they can pin the blame for legislative paralysis on the Democrats. Now Trump uses paralysis as part of his defense strategy, arguing falsely that Democrats can't investigate his crimes and legislate good reforms at the same time. McConnell doesn't even deign to offer an alternative agenda and the Trump administration doesn't have one.

When Republicans controlled everything for two years after Trump's



election, they passed only two notable reforms: an obscene tax bill that benefited the rich and the CEOs, and a decent criminal justice reform bill that made the first steps toward reducing mass incarceration. Republicans failed to offer a coherent alternative to the Affordable Care Act. They failed to offer a serious plan to rebuild our infrastructure.

The administration rolled back protections of our air and water, and Republicans looked the other way. The paralysis in Washington won't change until McConnell and Senate Republicans start losing elections. They are standing in the way of reforms this country desperately needs. And they will continue to do so, until voters move them out of the way.

Antwone Muhammad explains how cancer saved his life

According to the American Cancer Society, about 2,670 men will be diagnosed with breast cancer this year. The lifetime chance of getting breast cancer in the United States for men is 1 in 833.

Chicago hip-hop artist Antwone Muhammad was diagnosed with breast cancer in December of 2013. In June of 2014 after surgery and chemotherapy, he went into remission. In June of 2019, his cancer recurred. Muhammad remains a beacon of light as he continues to fight. Rolling out spoke with Muhammad about his battle, his new book, which he explained at a fundraiser he had this month.

What were your initial feelings when you were diagnosed with cancer again?

It hurt because so much has happened in the past year but I prayed and I trust that I will be victorious again with God's help and support of family and friends.

What are some of the misconceptions when it comes to men and this disease?

The main misconception is that men can't get breast cancer. It's

largely viewed as a woman's illness. This illness affects 1 percent of men.


What were some of the symptoms that caused you to take notice?

I started feeling sensitivity on the left side of my chest on my nipple. Soon after, brown fluid started discharging from my chest. This led me to [go to] the emergency room [and] after a series of tests, I was diagnosed with stage three breast cancer.

Talk about your book Cancer Saved My Life. Why did you decide to write the book and why that

I feel sharing my experience can help others in their journey and possibly can prevent someone from having a similar experience. The title is important because people only change for three reasons. There are three levels of change. Level one is when we know enough to be able to change. This is when a person has empowered themselves to change. This is the best place to make a change but hardly anyone does. Next is level two. This is when you have to ask yourself, "do I care enough to want to change?" We ask this after we know enough to change but still have not made the change due to excuses or stalling. Last is level three. When we hurt enough to have to change. This is where most make a change. Cancer was that pain for me. It forced me to make changes that have and [are] saving my life. I'm urging people to empower yourself at level one so something like cancer will not have to save you. Save yourself by being proactive [about] illness instead of reactive.

Ask Rusty- Understanding the Family Maximum

Dear Rusty: My husband passed away when our children were 3 and 5 years old. I received benefits for myself, our two children and my 14-year old son from a previous relationship. When my 14-year-old son turned 18, the amount he received stopped and was added to ours, keeping the total family amount the same. Then in July of this year my youngest daughter turned 16 so I fell off with that amount now going to my kids. Again, the total family amount stayed the same - \$625.00 each for my daughter and son. The very next month in August, my youngest son turned 18 so of course, he fell off. I called Social Security and the representative said that she couldn't guarantee that my son's full amount will go to my daughter. It turns out that none did, decreasing the family amount by \$625.00. My question is why was the family amount reduced when she still has 2 years before she turns 18? Signed: Confused Survivor

Dear Confused: I understand your confusion - let me clarify what happened in your situation: Social Security (SS) sets "Family Maximum" amount, which is the most all eligible family members combined can receive from a worker's (your husband's) record. SS uses a rather complex formula to compute the Family Maximum amount, but it comes out to be somewhere between 150% and 180% of your husband's "primary insurance amount" (or "PIA," what he was entitled to when he passed). The family maximum is in effect whenever there are multiple beneficiaries on a worker's record.

The benefits you were personally receiving were "child in care" benefits which entitled you, as a surviving spouse with a minor child, to collect 75% of the benefit your husband was receiving, or entitled to receive, at his death. Child in care benefits stop when the yougest child reaches 16 years of age. Each of your 3 minor children were also entitled to receive 75% of their deceased father's (or stepfather's) benefit amount. Minor children can receive 75% of the deceased parent's benefit until they reach 18 y\ears of age (or 19 if still in high school). However, all benefits are subject to the "family maximum." The total of benefits paid to all survivors of the deceased is limited to that family maximum and, if that amount is reached, all eligible survivors share equally in that family maximum amount. Then as each survivor becomes ineligible due to their age, the remaining survivors each receive a proportional share of the family maximum amount, but that adjustment cannot result in an individual's benefit being more than they are otherwise entitled to (their maximum individual benefit of 75% of your husband's PIA).

When your oldest son turned 18 and became ineligible, the sum of benefits due all remaining survivors was still more than the family maximum, so the family maximum amount was equally divided among the remaining eligible survivors. Than, when your eligibility for child-in-care benefits ceased when your youngest turned 16, your two remaining minor children each received either a) their equal share of the family maximum, or b) 75% of their father's PIA (their normal entitlement as a surviving minor child). When your youngest son turned 18 and became ineligible, your youngest daughter was then eligible to receive only her full benefit as a minor surviving child (75% of your husband's benefit), which she can continue to receive until she is 18 (or 19 if still in high school). So, as you can see, the family maximum isn't an amount which is fully available to any survivor, it is an amount that restricts the total amount whch can be paid to all when there are multiple eligible survivors.

Please note that at age 60 you are once again eligible for a surviving spouse benefit, which will be based upon 100% of the benefit your husband was entitled to at his death, subject, of course, to normal reductions and earnings restrictions for claiming benefits before your full retirement age.



IN MEMORIAM: John Conyers Dies at 90



Former Congressman Conyers, whose 15-year fight to pass legislation that would make Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday a federal holiday, has died. He was 90.

The longtime Michigan Democrat represented what is now the state's 13th Congressional District (which includes parts of western Detroit) for more than 50 years. Conyers resigned in 2017.

Conyers was born in Detroit in 1929. He was elected to Congress in 1965 and immediately became a forceful voice in the Civil Rights Movement, cosponsoring the Voting Rights Act of that same year.

Conyers was the first African American to chair the powerful House Judiciary Committee and helped spearhead the 1994 Violence against Women Act.

Conyers and 12 other African American members of the House of Representatives founded the Congressional Black Caucus in 1971.

"We always knew where he stood on issues of equality and civil rights in the fight for the people," Rep. Rashida Tlaib, who now represents Conyers'

City crews will not be able to return to an area once we have completed collection. If you miss collection, do not place leaves in the street. At that point, the options for residents are to:

- Compost the leaves.
- Take the leaves to one of four transfer locations that will be available free disposal. They are at Bowman Park, Detwiler Park, Ravine Park, and the ODOT facility at Detroit and Glendale avenues . The sites will be open 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday through Saturday.
- · Dispose of leaves in your

gray trash container.

All vehicles should be off the street when leaf collection crews come to your neighborhood in order to get the street as clean as possible. City crews will leave a tag at the homes where parked vehicles prevented the

collection of all leaves. It will include information on what to do with leaves that are left behind under vehicles.

Curbed streets will be marked complete once a street

sweeper has passed. Crews will attempt to complete a street in one day but it may extend into a second day. The city will have a concentrated leaf collection effort in the 43605 zip code.

Home Fire Risks Increase As Weather Cools

The fall and winter seasons bring temperatures, holidays, and images of cozy nights by the fireplace. Yet the change in seasons also comes with the chance of

- Know where the gas, electric, and water main shut-off controls are and how to use them.
- Place fire extinguishers in the kitchen, garage, and living room, and make sure all household members know how to use them.
- Develop a home fire escape plan and practice it with the entire family.
- Keep portable generators outside and away from the home.
- Install a screen in front of each fireplace or wood stove. Store cooled ashes in a metal container outside the home.
- Have chimneys professionally inspected and cleaned every year.
- Keep anything that can burn

heaters, generators, and fireplaces at least three feet away from or other heat source.

- Never leave lit candles unattended, and keep them out of the reach of children and pets.
- If using a live Christmas tree, keep it adequately watered and get rid of it after Christmas or when it gets dry.

Residents can also take an active role in protecting their communities from hazards such as fires, medical emergencies, and much more. Fire departments across the country are looking for volunteers to serve as firefighters, EMS providers, and auxiliary members.

"The majority of firefighters in the U.S. are volunteersneighbors helping neighbors in an incredible and rewarding way," said Hirsch. "We need more people to answer the call to serve."

Training is provided by the department, and volunteers can serve in a variety of roles, from providing life-saving emergency response services to conducting fire prevention programs and disaster preparedness planning.

Mr. Jefferson said. "She drives me to all my new stories."

Guest speaker Touré candidly shared his perspective on the current climate in the United States under Donald Trump as president and why it is imperative that black and brown people take a stand against what he called Trump's racist

"If you can call Trump's thought process a philosophy, it's based on white supremacy and white victimhood and white privilege. And the core idea in the electorate, the core idea that has made people susceptible to his message

> is a widespread fear of the coming demographic shift," Touré said. "In 2040, America will become predominantly people of color."

> Touré elaborated saying that the fear many white people feel about the coming demographic shift is connected to their fear of losing political, cultural, and economic power. He also said it is these fears that have led to a rise in 'white anger' and a widespread acceptance of "Trump's racism." Acknowledging that the road to freedom leaves many weary, Touré encouraged the crowd to keep their eyes on the prize and develop a "Teflon shield" that enables them to continue to fight while maintaining self.

> "We fight back because we must. We fight back because we as people are survivors and we have been through too much to stop now. We fight back because of course when we fight back, we win," he said. "We fight back because in spite of the racism we know, this country is ours too."

How to Detect Flooded Cars

BETHESDA, Md., Recently, severe weather, unprecedented rainfall and flooding have taken their toll on car owners. Many in the affected areas have driven through high water that may have damaged their vehicles. Even if your vehicle was not flooded or completely covered in water, the nonprofit Car Care Council recommends that you follow these guidelines to check for damage due to water intrusion or contamination:

Check interior carpets, upholstery and door and trim panels for dampness. If they are wet, the vehicle needs professional attention. If you simply let the carpet dry, it will quickly grow mildew and give off foul odors. Seat brackets, motors and modules should also be checked for rust and proper operation.

If the fluid appears milky, diluted, is no longer its original color or is beige in color, then it is likely the pans contain water and the vehicle should be towed to your repair shop. Driving the vehicle with water present may damage the internal parts and require extensive overhaul or repairs. The council reminds motorists that some synthetic differential fluids may appear to be milky, but are not water contaminated. When in doubt, a professional automotive technician should make the evaluation.

•Check the air filter for water. If it is wet, replace the air filter and change the oil.

It was apparent that Brown was one of those men in college yet he still was not drafted by any professional football team after leaving school in 1963.

Being undrafted did not stop Willie Brown from enjoying a standout something special prior

professional football career with the Denver Broncos and Oakland Raiders. Much of his career was highlighted by big plays and interceptions in the postseason for the Raiders as they were one of the best NFL teams during his time there. He also earned the fitting nickname "Old Man Willie" for his looks. However, one of the things that Willie Brown should remembered for is his annual participation in the NFL Draft over the last decade.

As a former Raider, Brown used to announce some of the Raiders later round draft picks at the podium of the NFL Draft in recent years. The timing of the NFL Draft on the calendar often took place slightly before a major holiday and Willie Brown reminded people of that. He would also do
